



Not Done Yet — and Not Slowing Down

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Some people mark time in office by press conferences and talking points. Jason Ortitay marks it by phone calls returned, projects finished, and real results delivered for the people he represents.

Today, Ortitay announced he is running for reelection to the Pennsylvania House of Representatives, because the work isn't done, the 46th District is moving in the right direction, and slowing down has never really been his style.

"I've loved this job because it's real," Ortitay said. "Real people. Real problems. Real wins with real impact. And while we've made a lot of progress together, there's still more worth fighting for."

Since taking office, Ortitay has helped deliver meaningful investments back to the 46th District, supporting safer infrastructure, stronger communities, and long-needed local improvements. He has built a reputation for turning long-standing concerns into action by working side-by-side with local officials, community leaders, and residents to get things done.

In Harrisburg, Ortitay has built a reputation for doing the unglamorous work, like reading the bills, asking tough questions, and pushing for policies that actually work. Education has been a central priority of his legislative work. He has been a leading advocate for early literacy reform, stronger accountability, and policies that give students the tools they need to succeed while respecting parents, teachers, and local communities.

Beyond legislation, Ortitay has focused on helping people and local communities navigate state government by bringing folks together, cutting through red tape, and finding practical solutions when the system feels complicated. Often, the work isn't about legislation at all—it's about making sure someone isn't stuck, ignored, or left without answers.

Over multiple terms, Ortitay has earned the experience and relationships needed to move ideas from concept to completion. His approach has always been rooted in collaboration by working with anyone willing to focus on results and put the district first.

"This job isn't about credit," Ortitay said. "It's about working together and getting things done for the people we serve."

Looking ahead, Ortity says the most exciting work is still in front of the district: stronger schools, smarter infrastructure investments, a growing local economy, and a government that works better because people are willing to roll up their sleeves together.

“The 46th District is special,” Ortity said. “It’s hardworking, resilient, and full of people who care deeply about their communities. The future here is bright, and I want to keep showing up every day to help make it even brighter.”
